

## **District Oratorical Contest is April 26**

The Topic for the OI Oratorical Contest this year is "How Optimism Has Guided Me Through Trying Times".

The Purpose: The contest is designed for youth to gain experience in public speaking, perfect selfexpression, gain self-assurance, improve communication skills, and provide them with the opportunity to compete for a college scholarship.

Funding: The Optimist Oratorical Scholarships are funded by member donations to the Optimist International Foundation. It is important that all members understand the significance of supporting the Foundation in order to continue funding the contest.

Who: The contest is open to contestants under 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 – September 30) who have not yet completed high school. There is no minimum age.

Club Contests: A club may be represented at the District by no more than two qualified contestants. There is no minimum required number of participants for club contests. District Contests: Each winner of the District level contest will receive a scholarship for use at a college, university or trade school only. There will be three winners awarded scholarships of \$2,500, \$1,500, and \$1,000, respectively, for first, second, and third place. District contests must have no fewer than three participants. The 3rd Quarter WINUM conference will host the 2025 District Oratorical Contest in Stevens Point on Saturday, April 26, in the morning. Please let me know if you will be participating this year. The winner will repeat their oratorical speech during the conference lunch, with the 1st place winner attending the World Championship in St. Louis.
