





District Oratorical Contest is April 26

This year's Topic for the OI Oratorical Contest is "How Optimism Has Guided Me Through Trying Times".

- The Purpose: The contest is designed for youth to gain experience in public speaking, perfect selfexpression, gain self-assurance, improve communication skills, and provide them with the opportunity to compete for a college scholarship.
- Funding: The Optimist Oratorical Scholarships are funded by member donations to the Optimist International Foundation. To continue funding the contest, all members must understand the significance of supporting the Foundation.

- Who: The contest is open to contestants under 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year
 (October 1 September 30) who have not yet completed high school. There is no minimum age.
- Club Contests: A club may be represented at the District by no more than two qualified contestants. There is no minimum required number of participants for club contests. Here is the Oratorical Contest Club Planning Guide: https://www.optimist.org/documents/2025/programs/24-25 Oratorical Club Planning Guide.pdf
- District Contests: Each winner of the District level contest will receive a scholarship for use at a college, university, or trade school only. Three winners will be awarded scholarships of \$2,500, \$1,500, and \$1,000, respectively, for first, second, and third place. District contests must have no fewer than three participants.

The Third Quarter WINUM conference will host the 2025 District Oratorical Contest in Stevens Point on the morning of Saturday, April 26. Please let me know if you will be participating this year. The winner will repeat their oratorical speech during the conference lunch, with the 1st place winner attending the World Championship in St. Louis.




